

From watching a Canucks game at Rogers Arena in Vancouver, to building a computer from scratch, Bryton has gone above and beyond to share some incredible experiences with Lucas. A recent highlight for the match includes a recent ski trip to Sun Peaks in February 2020.

Looking back on his time with Big Brother, Lucas says "I appreciate how Bryton encouraged me to do new things I wouldn't have done before, like building a computer. Bryton and I got all the parts together and built it from scratch in two weeks." Among all the trips, Lucas mentions how some of his favorite activities had Bryton and Lucas stick close to home. The two often enjoy venturing into the outdoors of the Cariboo Chilcotin, taking on adventures of ATVing and fishing.

Bryton says that he has learned so much from Lucas, who is more outdoorsy than he is. 

Watching both Lucas and Bryton grow together has been inspiring. We want to give special recognition to their match, and honor their dedication to each other and to the organization.




# Jumpstart Red Sock Campaign >

On September 7 2019, Big Brothers Big Sisters of Williams Lake ran the first ever Backwoods TRY-Athlon at Gavin Lake Forest Education Center. The new event was met with overwhelming positivity, with over 65 participants taking on the challenge. TRY-Athloner's competed in backwoods terrain as individuals or group relays. The course included a 5 kilometer paddle, 11 kilometer bike ride, and finished with a 7 kilometer run. In total, the new fundraiser raised over \$18,000 that went directly to supporting our Community-based and In-school Mentoring programs.

Top Fundraiser for the event was Kara Mills, who raised \$1145. For her efforts, Kara won an Opus Sonar Mountain Bike Donated by Red Shred's Bike and Board. We also want to give great big thanks to our sponsors, The West Fraser Truckers Association, Penney Mechanical Ltd, Cameron & Co Accountants, and Pioneer Logging. Their support helped us to run such a fantastic fundraiser that allowed our community to get out in nature and challenge themselves.

# Jordan Siegmueller Memorial Charity Golf Tournament

"The tournament is popular due to who Jordan was — not only to the golf course, but to the community. He was involved in a lot and he had such an infectious personality."



On November 22 2019, Big Brothers Big Sisters of Williams Lake released the much anticipated Carol and Archie Dicecco Cookbook. Carol and Archie were owners and operators of the popular Trattoria Pasta Shoppe that closed in August of 2018.

The family-owned business was a well-loved restaurant, and attended by many Williams Lake diners for their quality authentic Italian food. With over 28 recipes, the cookbook included classic Trattoria dishes like the Cajun Chicken Fettucine and the famous cheesecake.

The cookbook was sponsored by over 30 local businesses, including gold sponsors PMT, Bob's Footwear and Apparel, and Williams Lake Credit Union. The community support was incredible, with the first 1,000 prints selling out in TWO days!

Overall, the cookbook raised over \$48,000, making it the most successful fundraiser of the year. Months later, the books are still in demand throughout the Cariboo. Copies can be purchased at serval local retailers, including Realm of Toys, Taylor Made Cakes, and Bob's Footwear and Apparel. We want to give a great B1G thank you to these businesses for supporting us in this incredible journey.

## July 2019-June 2020 Chair Report

2019-2020 was a successful but also challenging year for Big Brothers Big Sisters of Williams Lake. Staff and volunteers have done a fantastic job adapting and creating programming that fits into the new normal of service delivery due to COVID 19.

2019–2020 was Angela Kadar's first full year as Executive Director for BBBSWL. She did an outstanding job leading the team, maintaining, building community relationships, developing funds and navigating the agency through the beginning of a pandemic. Angela's willingness to think outside of the box and aptitude to learn has quickly turned her into a recognized leader in our community.

We said goodbye to the ISM Coordinator Natasha Johnson and, in turn, welcomed Rylee Wallner into the position. After several years of dedication, Joanna Saunders stepped down as Treasurer and resigned from the Board. Sarah Batke has stepped into the role of Treasurer for a two-year term in February. Through these transitions, the BBBSWL team-maintained unity and continuity of programming.

In September, we hosted the 1st Annual Backwoods TRY-Athlon at Gavin Lake, raising over \$18,000. In partnership with Carol and Archie Diecco, a cookbook was created that raised over \$48,000 for the agency. Our Disney Themed Bowl for Kid's Sake was cancelled due to the pandemic but has been rescheduled for next spring. Once again, the Jordan Siegmueller Memorial Golf Tournament chose us as a charity of choice, We are grateful to have been selected for another year and are looking forward to being a part of this meaningful and fun event. The postponement of these two events was disappointing but necessary as part of the collective effort regarding community safety.

Looking back over the year, I can say that I feel confident that our new fundraiser, Back Woods Try-Athlon, will become just as loved as its predecessor Tour de Cariboo. The Board is grateful to have such a strong team of staff and volunteers that continue to spark potential in the young people the agency serves

I am looking forward to watching how the staff and volunteers continue to contribute to our youth's health and happiness over the next year.

## July 2019-June 2020 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR REPORT

We started the year off on a high note, creating a brand new fundraiser called The Backwoods TRY-Athlon and partnering with the Sugar Cane Development Corporation to host a local Ribfest and Williams Lake Craft Beer Festival. Our agency received \$3,500 from the Williams Lake First Nation as a result of the amazing support from the beer and barbeque-loving residents of the Cariboo. Raising over \$18,000, the Backwoods TRY-Athlons success solidified itself as key fundraiser for our agency. Next, we worked around the clock to release the much anticipated Carol and Archie Dicceco Cookbook. Longtime Trattoria customers lined up at local vendors, waiting for a chance to grab a copy. The cookbook was so popular, we had to double our order!

With yet another successful fundraiser under our belt, Executive Assistant Susan Erlandson geared up for Bowl For Kids Sake 2020. The longtime event saw more registration than ever before. Scheduled for March 27, April 3, and April 4th, the event was postponed to 2021 due to COVID-19 restrictions. The pandemic completely altered our fundraising success. With increased restrictions and health concerns, our matches suffered as well.

In May, our In-School Mentoring (ISM) program was forced to close for the remainder of the school year. In response, our new ISM Coordinator Rylee Wallner created a virtual program called Online Go Girls! which connects youth aged 11–13 with mentors. Together, they learn about balanced eating, active living, and self-care.

Natasha Pilkington, our Community-based Mentoring Coordinator, released all new socially-distant activities and training for Bigs and Littles. Community-based matches were at an all-time high as Natasha and the rest of the team delivered food and activities to our families in need during the lockdown.

Running both ISM and Community-based programs, Mentoring Coordinator Marilia Vieira used a Pen Pal option to keep her mentors connected through letters and crafts. Transitioning to a virtual format allowed us to provide mentorship to youth during the COVID-19 crisis. Additionally, services like food security allowed our agency to provide support to youth and families. Our agency worked to be the glue in our community, providing food security to families and a safe haven for children.

From developing new virtual programs, to delivering food and goods to families, our team continues to adapt to the requirements of COVID-19. As this year comes to a close, we look forward to adapting our programs to continue to serve the children and families of Williams Lake and 100 Mile House. I am proud that our team rose to the occasion of these unprecedented challenges with strength and tenacity.

We will continue to do so.

## July 2019-June 2020 Treasurer Report






