


Going above and beyond,

Yet again, Big Brothers Big Sisters of Williams Lake hosted the 3rd Annual Backwoods TRY-Athlon at Gavin Lake Forest Education Center. Amongst the chaos of a continuing global pandemic, staff at BBBSWL came up with creative new ways to host the outdoor event.

Again, TRY-Athloner's competed in backwoods terrain as individuals or group relays. The course included a 5 kilometer paddle, 11 kilometer bike ride, and finished with a 7 kilometer run. In total, the fundraiser raised over \$10,200 that went directly to supporting our Community-based and In-school Mentoring programs.

#### Jordan Siegmueller Memorial Charity Golf Tournament






